## A Jewish-Christian Partnership to Strengthen Mission Teaching Hospitals in Africa

\$1 Million Matching Challenge Grant from Rabbi Erica and Mark Gerson







#### Summary

Christian Missionaries provide 1/3 of all healthcare ' in sub-Saharan Africa.

Financial support for Christian mission hospitals has declined (i.e., the decline of Protestants, lack of ties between churches and hospitals, rise of short-term missions).

African Mission Healthcare Foundation aims to help fund the resource gap, support exceptional healthcare training, infrastructure and direct clinical care.



#### Summary, continued

The Gershons have offered a \$1 million challenge grant to Christian Broadcasting Network leaders and supporters to match 1:1.

The resulting \$2 million will be distributed to 8 medical missionaries and their mission teaching hospitals throughout Africa.





#### Co-Founded in 2010 by Mark Gershon and Dr. John Fielder.

Has awarded more than \$14 million to 30 hospitals in dozens of countries (e.g., HIV treatment, primary care, infectious diseases, maternal-child health, and surgery).

Funded 11,000 surgical cases.

Provided scholarship to over 100 health workers.

Helped establish pediatric rehab facility in Tanzania.



### African Mission Healthcare Foundation

Assisted in creation of a surgical theater in Uganda.

Helped create a surgical ward in Burundi.

Worked to provide housing at several hospitals.

Procured x-ray equipment and ambulances for 7 hospitals.

In 2016 alone – helped support 80,000 patient visits.

\$1 Million Matching Challenge Grant to Support Mission Teaching Hospitals

Challenges: Health training occurs in old, crumbling facilities.

Intermittent electric power.

Housing shortage.

Antiquated equipment.

Inadequate funds for basic patient care.





#### Where \$2 Million in Matching Funds Goes

## Provide approximately \$250,000 to 8 medical missionaries and their affiliated hospitals.

**Opportunity:** Overcome the barriers, provide high-quality healthcare and training, demonstrate the compassion of Jesus Christ.

**Impact:** Provide daily care, teach African health professionals, provide mentorship, discipleship, and model Christian compassion.





#### Dr. Reynier Ter Haar, Director and Family physician, Nkhoma Hospital, Malawi

As director of Nkhoma Hospital has helped serve 40,000 people and cut maternal mortality rates by 75% and drive down pediatric malaria infections dramatically.

Funds will construct 3 new houses, necessary for training programs for physicians who will then practice throughout Malawi.

Dr. Rick Sacra, Director, Family Medicine Training, ELWA Hospital, Liberia

During the Ebola epidemic, returned to Liberia to deliver babies and operate the hospital. Became infected with Ebola and survived.

Funds received will train 15 family medicine doctoral residents over the next 5 years who perform surgeries, deliver babies, teach nurses, and run hospitals throughout the country. Funds will also support 750 patients with HIV medicine and medical care.

Dr. Mark Jacobson, Director, Arusha Lutheran Medical Center (ALMC), Tanzania

Arusha Lutheran Medical Center cares for 150,000 patients annually, trains medical professionals, ministers to HIV population, provides neonatal and pediatric care.

Funds received will subsidize training for 100 nurses (1 nurse cares for 80,000 patients a year) and 150 children with disabilities will receive life-altering surgeries.

#### Dr. Erik Hansen, Pediatric Surgeon, Kijabe Hospital, Kenya

By 2025 there will be 350 million school-aged children in Kenya, thousands in need of heart surgery due to congenital surgery.

Funds received will provide training for 2 African pediatric surgeons who would each perform 10,000 – 15,000 surgeries and see 100,000 patients in a lifetime.



#### Dr. Zachary O'Connor, Surgeon, Bongolo Hospital, Gabon

Bongolo Hospital educates eye care professionals and is planning an anesthesia and primary care training program where there are few high-quality and high-level training programs in Frenchspeaking West Africa.

Funds will upgrade the hospitals' electrical system to position the institution as an anchor hospital (Multiple fires have threatened patient care areas due to outdated and faulty wiring, creating a severe fire hazard).

Dr. Jason Fader, Surgeon, Kibuye Hope Hospital, Burundi

Dr. Fader has led Kibuye Hope Hospital to become a major teaching facility after decades with no missionary or highquality medical training programs.

Funds will provide a critical new solar power system. (The nation's power grid supplies 4 hours of daily electricity. Generators supply 20 hrs. of power and missionary and staff housing have no lighting.)

Dr. Tony Mwenyemali, Surgeon and Medical Director, Maua Methodist Hospital, Kenya

As the only surgeon in at the hospital performs general, pediatric, trauma, plastic, urologic, and orthopedic surgery. Also teaches medical students, interns, and physicians assistants.

Funds will help renovate the outpatient, administrative and laboratory spaces of the hospital and would galvanize U.S. churches to add funding to the rebuilding effort.

Dr. Russ White, Cardiothoracic Surgeon, Tenwek Hospital, Kenya

He is starting the continent's first ever heart surgery training program outside of South Africa. (Thousands require heart surgery due to childhood infections which have damaged heart valves).

> Funds will provide housing for heart surgery trainees and upgrade the intensive care unit at Tenwek Hospital.
